## 2. Statutory tort for serious invasions of Privacy

Proposal 27 in the Federal Government's Privacy Act Report Review Report 2022 is to "Introduce a statutory tort for serious invasions of privacy in the form recommended by the ALRC in Report 123. Consult with states and territories on implementation to ensure a consistent national approach."

Late last year I prepared an article for LexisNexis providing background to the possible tort, the form it might take and anticipating its introduction. A statutory tort for serious invasions of privacy will create a new basis for enforcement of the right of privacy with significant implications for journalism and the reporting of news.
